Her words are relevant in today's world for they provide some clarity to the term "meaningful use". Likewise for those nurses that struggle with today's understanding of the electronic health record, appendix A will assist you to hone your skills to ask the right questions rather than " just filling in a box". For those who are building today's healthcare, this is the "roots" we need to go back to as a part of the "do over".For those considering a nursing as a second career - Chapter 15 and appendix B will provide you insight of the Nursing profession.While a nursing textbook is not for everyone, for those that are caring for an elder, Chapter 9 and appendix C will give coping skills to deal with the day to day challenges you face. Appendix A will help you focus your answers to the any health care provider questions in the rushed environment of the doctors office, urgent care clinic, the emergency department and when a hospital trip looms. Understanding "all those questions they ask you" ahead of time will help you maintain some control in a space where you don't have control. Chapter 6, Views of Nursing and Views of Human Kind, addresses nursing concepts through the views of nursing.
